Experience Tuvalu's traditional dance 'Fatele'

During the celebration, a traditional dance called 'Fatele' is danced. Using their bare hands, a group men create a rhythmic beat by tapping on a quare wooden box, leading to more than a dozen ancers synchronising their movements with the rhythm, Dancers wear skirts made from the leaves of pandanus plants and flower crowns in traditiona vivid costumes. The songs vary in their cultural. social, and biblical teachings. Come sing and dance with the people of Tuvalu!

Meaota faka<mark>lolo is</mark> a has become a cor dish made of raw tuna dressed in coconut milk. They are served with bread or rice. Coconut milk or coconu sap (kaleve) is often used to flavour dishes Fonu

Sea Turtle Cuisine. The meat is cooked slowly over a long period of time using a heat-retention cooking method called 'umu', which uses the residual heat from the soil and stones heated over an open fire and is full of flavour!

Tuvalu's unique stamp designs have attracted the attention of philatelists around the world. The government is making efforts to sell them and they ave even become sources of foreign currency. The amps come in various styles featuring nature, vildlife, local culture, traditions, and historical events. The post office also issues several stamps annually, such as commemorative stamps for the birth and death of famous historical figures. There are many stamps on the display in the facility, so please take your time and find your favourite stamp.

Column 1 Flag history of Tuvalu

The flag used since independence had the Union Jack in the upper left corner of the flag to indicate membership in the British Commonwealth. and the nine stars that make up Tuvalu. In 1995, a new flag was adopted without the Union Jack, but in 1997, the Tuyalu flag was restored to its original design.

Column 2 Tuna from Tuvalu to Japan?

Traditionally, interaction with Japan was limited, but after gaining independence in 1978, Japan immediately recognised the country as a state and established diplomatic relations. Friendly relationships have since been established. Japan has also concluded a Japan-Tuvalu Fisheries Agreement with Tuvalu and pays an entry fee for fishing vessels to operate in the Tuvalu Economic Zone. The tuna and bonito you eat in Japan may actually come from Tuvalu...!
